TO THE PARISHIONERS OF SMV

In George Weigel's book "Letters to a Young Catholic," he wrote a chapter entitled "Freedom for Excellence" as we further consider freedom, democracy and being Catholic in the United States.

We cannot think that "freedom" is the opportunity, (maybe, someone might think it is an "obligation") to act wild and crazy; doing it "our way," and think that in some way it will be all right in the end. There are too many divorces, broken families, sexual assaults, lack of temperance or modesty, that go hand in hand with no sense of virtue or sense of the good. Our Catholic Christian faith can and does help. Our faith is not libertine. "The richer, nobler idea of freedom the Catholic Church proposes...is the freedom for excellence – the freedom to do the right thing in the right way for the right reasons – as a matter of habit. That's the truly human way. Because that's the kind of freedom that satisfies our natural desire for happiness, which itself reflects our desire for God, who is all Good, all the way. Freedom helps us grow into the kind of people who can live with that God forever."

"Freedom untethered from moral truth will eventually become freedom's worst enemy. If there's only *your* truth and *my* truth and neither one of us acknowledges a transcendent referee – *the* truth – by which to settle our disagreements, then one of two things is going to happen: you're going to impose your power on me, or I'm going to impose my power on you."

"The moral architecture of freedom in the United States is crumbling. Young Catholics have a real opportunity, and a great responsibility, to do something about that...the best way to challenge the notion of content-free democracy is to ask, What's the idea of *person* here? Isn't there something terribly demeaning about reducing the "attributes of personhood" to a bundle of undisciplined desires? Aren't we better than that? Aren't we *more* than that? How are we going to have a genuine democracy if we can't talk with each other about what's good? How are we going to have a genuine democracy if...one class of citizens – who happen to be alive – assert a right to take the lives of other indisputably human creatures, who happen not to have been born yet? How are we going to have a genuine democracy if the fit and healthy assert the "right" to dispose of the inconveniently elderly, terminally ill, or radically handicapped?"

All this is being asserted today in the name of a false idea of freedom." John Carroll was from *the* Carroll family, and was the first American Catholic Bishop. "He had the intuition that Catholic ideas about freedom just might be crucial to the future prosperity of the American democratic experiment. Carroll had a very clear view of what the French Revolution – the world's first experiment in totalitarianism, an experiment based on radical assertions of willfulness – had done and meant. He knew, because he had seen, that democracy could degenerate into mobocracy or give birth to new and even bloodier forms of dictatorship if sufficient numbers of people bought a corrupt idea of freedom." Pray for our country, our leaders and our bishops and for those who display moral courage, truth and virtue.
