The Parish Offering

O Lord, who art ever merciful and bounteous with Thy gifts, look down upon the suffering souls in purgatory. Remember not their offences and negligences, but be mindful of Thy loving mercy, which is from all eternity. Cleanse them of their sins and fulfill their ardent desires that they may be made worthy to behold Thee face to face in Thy glory. May they soon be united with Thee and hear those blessed words which will call them to their heavenly home: "Come, blessed of My Father, take possession of the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world."

To the Parishioners of St. Mary the Virgin,

In Paul's Letter to the Romans (we are going through at daily Mass), at one point he says we must think of ourselves as dead to sin and to live for God in Christ Jesus. Therefore, let's start at the beginning. If you believe that God made the world and all *that* implies; if you believe that God made us he *gave us* our gifts, our talents, our hopes and dreams; and if you believe that creation is *for good*, therefore God made us for good and to do good. Then, even though there is sin and sometimes it seems it takes over, always, always remember the grace of God is ever greater. All of us know that the body can be used for good or for ill. We have got to know and to teach we can do good and be good and with great confidence we say that all things done in everyday life, when done for Christ, will be good.

But on the same day the reading had Jesus say "I have come to set the earth on fire, and how I wish it were already blazing," and talks of the division within families that will happen. These images of fire seem so stark and foreboding. We have to understand the imagery that is going on. First, we remember the symbols of the Holy Spirit, which are all symbols of God's presence and love, but also of God's judgment on sinners and of divine purification. The symbols are: Water, signifying "new" birth and life in the Holy Spirit (especially baptism); Oil, signifying abundance and healing; Cloud and Light, signifying guidance and knowledge; Sealing, as in confirmation, being sealed with the Holy Spirit; the Finger of God, that each of us are known and counted; the Dove signifying peace; and Fire (tongues of fire) signifying transforming energy. Fire is especially important. We have lost any sense of the importance of this imagery and how stark, real and foreboding it would be to those listening to Jesus. It was the early Greeks who believed that everything in the world was made up of four elements: earth, water, air and fire, and everything in the world had some combination of the four. Before we dismiss that as "old fashioned," remember that modern science says there are four states of matter: solid (earth), liquid (water), gas (air) and plasma (fire). The Greeks knew more than we give credit! But also remember this, as outlined by Fr. Arminjon in the 1880's, fire was the first created force to have developed its energy and displayed its activity. It was fire that set the elements to work! Genesis 1: 2 says, "The earth was void and empty, and darkness was upon the face of the deep," but then the quickening breath of an eternal, all powerful agent came, when "the Spirit of God moved over the waters," It was a "blast furnace" of the Holy Spirit, a heat of immeasurable intensity that started the transformation of the elements to the creation we know today. Let us think of the Holy Spirit as a blast furnace in our lives and in our Church, capable of faithful, truthful transformation.

Who among us has not experienced division in our families? Who has not experienced those who have left the faith, or the Church? One of the most enduring writings by St. Pope John Paul II dealt with the dignity and worth of the human person and how we should use our bodies. It is that which is precisely being "debated" in the battle for the soul of the Church in Rome. It is part and parcel of the drama of life since Paul wrote to the small Christian group in Rome. The "blast furnace" of the Holy Spirit has set our world in motion; has given us sacred scripture; has given extraordinary witness to the faith by countless saints, and now, especially by St. John Paul the Second. The battle for each of our souls, the soul of our nation and culture, our Church, is being played out in current issues today and it threatens further division. Pray the Holy Spirit may bring the truth to all people of life lived *in* Christ, of healing, of guidance, of transformation and of peace towards (always) what is good. May the blast furnace of the Holy Spirit come upon our Church, our families and especially our hearts to bring unity where there is now division and discord.
