Gospel

John 6:1-15

At that time: Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, which is the Sea of Tiberias. And a multitude followed him, because they saw the signs which he did on those who were diseased. Jesus went up into the hills, and there sat down with his disciples. Now the Passover, the feast of the Jews, was at hand. Lifting up his eyes, then, and seeing that a multitude was coming to him, Jesus said to Philip, "How are we to buy bread, so that these people may eat?" This he said to test him, for he himself knew what he would do. Philip answered him, "Two hundred denarii would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a lad here who has five barley loaves and two fish; but what are they among so many?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was much grass in the place; so the men sat down, in number about five thousand. Jesus then took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. And when they had eaten their fill, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up and filled twelve baskets with fragments from the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten. When the people saw the sign which he had done, they said, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world!" Perceiving then that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, Jesus withdrew again to the hills by himself.

For all those wondering how a loved one may be placed on the "For the Faithful Departed — Anniversary of Death" list that we see every week in the bulletin and use for our daily devotionals, you are invited to call the office and have a name placed on the list. Please inform the office of the relationship you have (brother, sister, mother, friend etc.) with the name, so that we know who to contact for future updating.

SPECIAL INTENTIONS

It is a time honored tradition in the Catholic Church for people to ask for a Mass to be said on a particular day for a particular reason. A nominal donation is generally offered with the request. At. St. Mary the Virgin the donation for a special intention is \$10.00. This money goes into our general revenue for the operation of the church.

We do not accept special intentions for Masses on Sundays. Those Masses are prayed for the intentions of all the people of SMV. We accept a maximum of one special intention for each weekday Mass. These may be requested by coming by the office to sign up and offer your donation or by calling the office and mailing a check to the parish.

Intentions may be said for individuals for a variety of reasons; for healing, celebrations of milestones such as birthdays or graduations etc. A person may also request a Mass for an event; such as an anniversary, an answered prayer, a new job or a new baby. An intention may also simple for thanksgiving, for guidance, for help, for safety in travels etc. Such intentions should be noted with a few brief words.

Intentions may also be offered for someone who has died. If such is the case, please let the office know, so that we may specifically say that we "pray for the repose of the soul" of that individual.

To the Parishioners of St. Mary the Virgin,

"The transmission of human life is a most serious role in which married people collaborate freely and responsibly with God the Creator. It has always been a source of great joy to them, even though it sometimes entails many difficulties and hardships.

"The fulfillment of this duty has always posed problems to the conscience of married people, but the recent course of human society and the concomitant changes have provoked new questions. The Church cannot ignore these questions, for they concern matters intimately connected with the life and happiness of human beings.

Those are the two opening paragraphs of Pope Paul VI's encyclical Humanae vitae. This past Wednesday July 25, was the 50th anniversary of its release in 1968. I have brief memories of the swirl of discussion and anger that ensued among my parents and students in grade and junior high school. Because my family was protestant, my perspective was different from many of our neighbors and acquaintances who were Catholic. I very clearly remember how awful 1968 was for our country, our politics, and especially our hope and outlook for the future. In many ways that year was the "perfect storm" of controversy, divisiveness, chaos, and dissention. There was the war in Vietnam, the battle for civil rights which had taken a violent turn, college campus' turned upside down, a president who declined to seek re-election, standards of morals and behavior being cavalierly thrown aside, and the horrible assassinations; it was not a good year. And in the middle of it the church re-proposed traditional teaching to Catholics in regard to contraception and the raising of children. It was not well received. Father Zulsdorf wrote a reflection on the anniversary that I would like to excerpt:

"The Devil is at work in attacks on Humanae vitae. Be wary. When you read or hear someone undermining Humanae vitae you have encountered an agent of Hell. Be vigilant. The Enemy, like a roaring lion, is roaming about seeking whom he may devour. Resist the attacks of Hell, [be] strong in our sure Faith. For those of you who struggle with the Church's teaching, remember that through suffering you can come to glory, the glory to which Christ has called us. In your fidelity, Christ will strengthen you and ready you for heaven."

"Some of you younger readers might not have the background on Humanae vitae even though you know that in this encyclical, Paul VI affirmed the Church's teaching about artificial contra-ception for the purposes of avoiding (ending?) pregnancy. Remember that some contraceptives are really abortifacients."

"In 1963 John XXIII assembled a commission to study the question of artificial contraception in the light of modern times, developments, and questions. Oral contraceptives (abortifacients?) appeared in 1960. He did not want the issue discussed at Vatican II, even though the somewhat overly optimistic and rather too anthropocentric Gaudium et spes [Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World] included a section on marriage. John died in 1963 and Paul was elected. He expanded the commission to 72, including physicians, women, bishops, cardinals, theologians. In 1966 the commission issued a majority report (64 of 69 voting members) and a minority report. The majority suggested to Paul that artificial birth control is NOT intrinsically evil and that couples could make their own decisions about using it. The minority included Americans, a Jesuit, Fr John Ford, and lay theologian Germain Grisez. Their report read in part:

"If contraception were declared not intrinsically evil, in honesty it would have to be acknowledged that the Holy Spirit in 1930, in 1951 and 1958, assisted Protestant churches, and that for half a century Pius XI, Pius XII and a great part of the Catholic hierarchy did not protect against a very serious error, one most pernicious to souls, for it would thus be suggested that they condemned most imprudently, under the pain of eternal punishment, thousands upon thousands of human acts which are now approved. Indeed, it must be neither denied nor ignored that these acts would be approved for the same fundamental reasons which Protestantism alleged and which they (Catholics) condemned or at least did not recognize. Therefore one must very cautiously inquire whether the change which is proposed would not bring along with it a definitive depreciation of the teaching and the moral direction of the hierarchy of the Church and whether several very grave doubts would not be opened up about the very history of Christianity."

"Remember that Anglicans had allowed contraception in 1930 and other Protestant groups permitted it thereafter."
